## Dear Alumni:

My husband, Joe, and I have been houseparents at Milton Hershey School for nine years, but our journey to houseparenting at Milton Hershey School started long before 2013. We were tired of clocking in and out at a job every day simply for a paycheck and longed for work that was meaningful, would make a difference, and leave a lasting impact.

In 2011, we were living halfway across the country, pregnant with our first child, and searching for an occupation that checked all of those boxes. That's when we found MHS. The school was hiring for a position called houseparents. It was everything we were looking for.

The day after my 27th birthday, we filled out our applications online and by August, now with two kids under two, we were beginning a career as houseparents.

We need to pause at this point in the narrative.

Have you ever gone to see a movie in the theater? Perhaps it is a film that you have been waiting months or years for. Maybe it is the next in your favorite series. You have watched every trailer, every press interview, and read every anticipatory article; you are ready! You grab your popcorn and candy and settle into your seat. The previews end, the lights go down, and the moment is finally here. You could not be more prepared for this. However, just minutes into the film, the plot takes an unexpected turn and everything you thought was going to happen is upended and replaced by an entirely different and even more intricate storyline. That has been our houseparenting journey.

When my husband, Joe, and I began our jobs at MHS, we were prepared. We conducted research, learned the history of the school and town, drove around campus, and watched videos about the mission. Our purpose was clear—we were going to make an impact.

However, as the months and years passed, the plot took an unexpected turn. The more students we met, the more lives we became invested in. The more we realized the resulting impact was primarily on our lives.

After nine years, we have had the opportunity to care for more than 40 students at our student home, not to mention the 100 or more students we got to know during our time as flex houseparents. The relationships we have forged with each one of those kids and their families has impacted our lives tremendously.

It has shifted and shaped the way we view the world. As our students have shared stories of discrimination and hatred levied toward them based on skin color, ethnicity, or social status it has opened our eyes to experiences we have never had and deepened our understanding and empathy.

I started this position with a single narrative of what a student in need looked like and what being a houseparent to those students would be like. The plot shift has been challenging and more wonderful than we could have ever imagined.

Amy applied in March 2021 and began working as a TSL in August. She is responsible for a territory that includes multiple Walmart retail locations in the Oklahoma City area in Oklahoma.

Amy said she has learned something new about herself every day as a TSL and has become more confident in her abilities. Amy said taking this job and moving to a new place took courage and belief in herself.

Brandon has been working as a TSL for The Hershey Company in the St. Louis, Missouri area since August 2021. Before being hired for the TSL position, he worked for Allied Security in Philadelphia.

Brandon earned a bachelor's degree in communications with an emphasis in marketing from Temple University in 2020 He had interned during college for a top



consulting firm, an internship that usually led to an entry level job—until the opportunity vanished when the firm, like businesses nationwide, had to make difficult choices to adjust to the challenges of COVID-19.

Brandon heard about the TSL opportunity from his brother, MHS alumnus Pedro Rodriguez '18, who had an internship with the company.

In his role as a TSL, Brandon feels as though he is giving back to MHS. Pride is evident in his voice as he talks about creating and stocking Hershey displays featuring products that make customers happy, and in the long run, support his alma mater.

Brandon emphasized the importance of stepping outside your comfort zone to meet new people and explore new places. He also stressed the value of learning how to interact with people who have different attitudes and viewpoints, being flexible, and expecting the unexpected.

Devyn began working as a TSL for The Hershey Company as a college senior pursuing a bachelor's degree in business and management at Penn State Harrisburg. He learned about the opportunity while working part time at Starbucks in Hershey where many of his customers worked for The Hershey Company.

He applied in November of his senior year and began working part time second semester alongside seasoned employees. That led to a full-time position managing his own territory and 15 retail locations in Ohio.

As a TSL, Devyn became aware of opportunities, made new friends, and participated in collective work activities. For those interested in the TSL position, he suggested they should be self-motivated, team players, and open-minded, while challenging themselves to grow.

Recently, Devyn was hired as a business development manager at Red Roof Inn.

## A Physics Lesson at Hersheypark Accelerates Learning



or most people, going to Hersheypark is more about riding roller coasters than learning how they work. Milton Hershey School Middle Division students had the opportunity to visit Hersheypark to apply their knowledge of physics to roller coasters.

Engineers from Hershey Entertainment & Resorts (HE&R) met with groups of MHS eighth-graders to give behind-the-scenes tours of the rides at Hersheypark—explaining the importance of physics in making sure roller coasters are safe. The students explored pulley systems, magnetic breaks, kinetic energy, gravitational pull, and the laws of motion in addition to how employees take the cars on and off the tracks, the role that weight distribution plays in making roller coasters operate, and more.

"HE&R prioritizes their interactions with MHS students and not only makes days like this possible but stresses the importance of us participating. For me personally, it's a lot of fun to talk to students about how roller coasters work because it's something a lot of people don't think or know about," said Brad Kirkham, director of engineering at HE&R.

Experiential learning opportunities like this allow MHS students the opportunity to see classroom topics in action. Thanks to our community partnerships, Hershey and the surrounding areas become their classroom.

"I learned more than physics, I learned about different careers. When we ride the rides, we don't think about how they work. Because of today, I now have a better understanding, but it doesn't make me feel differently about riding roller coasters," said Molina Folly, an MHS eighth-grader.

## **High School Students Work with Pennsylvania State Police to Solve Matters Affecting Teenagers**

students have been encouraged to use their voice to advocate for themselves and those around them. Recently, for the fifth year, 43 MHS high school students in the Law, Public Safety, and Security Career and Technical Education pathway were invited to participate in a Disproportionate Minority Contact Youth and Law Enforcement Forum with the Pennsylvania State Police Academy.

As a part of this forum, students were given space to share their past interactions with police, issues that are affecting teenagers today, and any questions they have about the profession.

Due to the diverse group of students MHS serves from across Pennsylvania and surrounding states, the conversations at the forum were enriching for both the students and the cadets. Some of the topics covered in the panel discussion and breakout sessions included personal stories



from MHS students involving previous interactions with police officers, what could have gone differently, and how things can change for the future.

"When we first got to the academy, I was hesitant to engage because of my own negative experiences with law enforcement," shared Candie Kolleh, MHS sophomore. "After getting to talk to them, I saw that we were all there to solve the same issues."

Many of the cadets were deeply impacted by the stories the students shared and how their role can have such profound outcomes on a child's life.

"The forum impacted me in a really positive way. I never thought that police officers or anyone in the criminal justice system would have the opportunity to come together in a positive way and communicate with civilians or teenagers to learn from one another," shared Osayomwonbor Algbedo, cadet at the PA State Police Academy.

## MHS Students Participate in a Networking Opportunity with Global Industrial Engineers from The Hershey Company

ighteen Milton Hershey School juniors and seniors participated in a networking event with 12 global manufacturing plant leaders from The Hershey Company and their supervisory-level manufacturing team.

The students who were chosen to participate have shown an interest in industrial engineering, from production line operators to strategically focused positions. The networking event allowed MHS students to interact with The Hershey Company employees and explore their career interests from professionals who work in their desired field firsthand.

"If I learned one thing from the networking event, it was all the different jobs that they have available at The Hershey Company plants," shared Tia Willis-Cooper, MHS junior. "I have a better understanding of the importance of mechanics in the industrial engineering process to ensure that everything is working correctly. I'd



never thought about the opportunities for mechanics outside of automotive careers."

After the networking portion of the evening, participants put their skills to the test and participated in a team building activity focused on engineering and design. Students learned about career options open to them in this field and how they can accomplish their career goals.

"It's always great to have a chance to connect with the brilliant students of Milton Hershey School," said Tim Hinegardner, vice president of manufacturing at The Hershey Company. "Milton Hershey School's century-long history of preparing students for life-long careers, including the trades, creates a great opportunity for a connection with Hershey's Manufacturing. I would love to see that legacy lead to even more students embracing manufacturing careers at Hershey."

Events like this are another way that the MHS Graduate Programs for Success Division is preparing students for post-graduation success. Through a robust Career and Technical Education program, MHS engages students in a variety of career-focused learning experiences from networking events to apprenticeship and internship opportunities.

Entree: Applewood-smoked lamb with an apricot-maple glaze, potato, and mushroom terrine, a beet and carrot mosaic, a wine cream sauce, and dandelion greens.

Dessert: A porcini mushroom, almond, and chocolate torte with a black pepper strawberry compote, burnt toast whipped cream, and strawberries.

"This competition helped us to prepare for our future careers by deepening our skills within culinary arts and teaching us how to work as a close-knit team," Elijah said. "Through this experience, we worked on our time management skills and decreasing waste." 2

## **Five Ways to Find Common Ground During Difficult Conversations**

t Milton Hershey School, students and staff follow four Sacred Values— Mutual Respect, Integrity, Positive Spirit, and Commitment to Mission. These principles guide our community as we navigate interactions with others, especially when we find ourselves in difficult conversations. Throughout my MHS career, I have incorporated tools when helping students and staff better understand each other.

When involved in a difficult conversation, implement the following tips for successful and rewarding dialogue.

Listen to one another and don't assume anything. Build understanding and trust by taking the time to hear the other person's

Remain objective and don't take anything personally. While it is tough, do the best you can to leave emotion out of the conversation. One tip is to ask open-ended questions. This will make the conversation two-way.



Be a bridge for communication, not a barrier. You may not be aware of your hidden biases, so be open to hearing another opinion. Use phrases such as, "Interesting... tell me more about that" and be ready to keep the conversation going.

Expect discomfort and prepare for it. Taking on topics that could be controversial or awkward isn't easy, so accept the situation as a challenge to step outside your comfort

zone. Be aware of your body language and theirs. Following verbal and non-verbal cues will help you ensure it doesn't escalate into a more heated conversation.

Create a safe space for dialogue by:


- Being present in the moment and conversation. If necessary, ask to put the phones away for a few minutes to eliminate any distractions.
- Encouraging candidness and transparency.
- Taking risks by not holding your perspective back; but also accepting that another point of view is possible.
- Using "I" statements versus "you"
- Maintaining respect and avoid jumping right into being defensive.
- Honoring confidentiality.

ilton Hershey School alumni who coach at their alma mater are more than coaches. They understand the value of addressing the needs of the whole child and embrace their role in supporting students as athletes and individuals. They embody the legacy of the coaches who did the same for them.

Twelve MHS graduates coach in Senior Division. Among them are Roger Smith '85 and Victoria Warne '12. Roger has led student programs for 24 years, and is head coach for the MHS track and field team. He has also been an assistant coach for football and track and field. Victoria has been part-time head coach for the JV softball team since November 2021. Both were athletes at MHS and strive to provide the same guidance and understanding their coaches gave them.

"Sometimes it's the best part of my day, because you get outside, and get to talk to young people," said Roger. Committed to supporting students and athletes as individuals, Roger emphasized the importance of commitment for anyone who would consider coaching at MHS.

"I've never wanted to be a commodity coach. A commodity coach is a person who only sees a person as what value they bring to their sport," Roger said. "I've always wanted to be a personal coach, and everybody gets treated the same. So, I care about you, your family, and your academic situation, because the sport piece is going to eventually end."

Like Roger, Victoria sees her role as a coach extending beyond teaching players the mechanics and rules of the

Roger went on to study industrial arts technology education at Millersville University and played football. He still has good memories of his experience at Millersville.

After earning his bachelor's degree, Roger was hired to do computer-aided drafting by alumni Milt '64 and Dick Purcell '61, who owned EDDCO, a company focused on designing, developing, and machining. When that company's business model changed, Roger became a draftsman for a company in York, Pennsylvania, where he worked until a co-worked mentioned an opening for a one-year position for a drafting teacher at MHS. Roger applied and was hired. A year later, he was offered a job as head of the newly formed student programs department, which he manages to this day.

Victoria enrolled at MHS in sixth grade after convincing her mother to let her and her brother apply. She learned about MHS from neighborhood friends who enrolled at the school and rode along with her friends and their mother when she took them back to MHS after a break. She was fascinated by the beautiful campus, talked to her friends' houseparents, and fell in love with MHS. To this day, she talks enthusiastically about her experiences and the relationships she has with graduates, coaches, and houseparents.

As a student at MHS, Victoria focused on health occupations in the health science career pathway. After MHS, she earned a bachelor's degree in business management in three years at Wilkes University, all while participating in softball, Air Force ROTC, student government, and Multicultural Club, and also maintaining a high GPA.



## MHS Has Been Honoring MHS Gold Star Alumni for 80 Years

une 8, 2022 marked the 80th anniversary of the first MHS Gold Star alumnus, Harold Ashenfelder '40. MHS Gold Star alumni

are those alumni who served in the Air Force, Army, Coast Guard, Marines, National Guard, or Navy and died while in honorable active military service to their country.

Harold enrolled in Hershey Industrial School at the age of 10 after his mother passed away. Harold was in the business vocational track, the accounting club, and played football his senior year. After graduating in 1940, he worked at The Hotel Hershey. Harold enlisted in the U.S. Navy on Dec. 19, 1941, 12 days after the attack on Pearl Harbor and was trained as a radio operator in a seaplane.



In May 1942, his patrol squadron was deployed to Newfoundland. The seaplanes provided convoy coverage, which was an

insurmountable challenge due to constant heavy fog and frequent failures of the primitive radar sets used by the squadron at the time. On June 8, 1942, Harold's plane was returning from a mission when bad weather forced them to land at sea after losing their bearings. Rescue aircraft could not locate the crew before heavy seas sank the plane.

The plane and crew were not recovered, and the crew is memorialized on the Tablets of the Missing at the East Coast Memorial in New York City.

The commemorative certificate of the East Coast Memorial contains this quote by General John J. Pershing, "Time will not dim the glory of their deeds"

The memory of Harold Ashenfelder and all the Gold Star alumni lives on at the Legacy Campus Middle Division student home Ashenfelder.

## MHS Archives Modernization Continues

he Department of School History is continuing the multiyear project to modernize the school's archival collection. The archivists began with the Hersheys' records comprised of documents, photographs, postcards, and objects belonging to or featuring the Hershey family. The second phase was Programs and Services, a large portion of the collection that now continues with students and alumni. Programs that overlap and photographs with no dates or identification create challenges. The collection includes several glass-plate negatives from the early 1900s. Even though they have been digitized, they have not been labeled separately. The negatives are fragile and require cautious handling when processing for identification. The image of early students in the carpentry classroom is a perfect example of the need for specific knowledge in handling the negatives, as evidenced by the fingerprints at the bottom of the image.



I had the humbling experience of processing and cataloging letters written by William Finnie '42, or Billy, as he signed his letters to his mother in Maple Shade, New Jersey. Billy graduated from Hershey Industrial School (now Milton Hershey School) in 1942. From the contents of the 228 letters, I could tell Billy and his mother shared a close bond, and thankfully, Mrs. Finnie saved them.

Billy's letters to his mother perfectly encapsulate the timeless experience of being a Milt.



(especially the dishes), and helped on the farm. Some of Billy's favorite activities stamp trading, sledding, and adventuring to Hersheypark. I found it amusing that Billy often complained about chores he didn't like, and he often expressed how relieved he was when he would finish up a day's worth of work on the farm. He was always excited to get a

day off from chores. His experience in the student home is almost a mirror image of the student home experience today—80 years later!

Even in the 1940s, Hershey Industrial School prepared students for life after graduation by providing them with technical courses automotive, construction, welding, etc.—and the opportunity to attend Hershey Junior College to receive higher education. Billy often wrote about his experiences in auto mechanics and how excited he was to continue working on cars. At MHS today, these classes have evolved and continue to give students experience in potential career fields. Students are offered courses through local colleges. The continuance of the Hersheys' mission to educate students beyond the classroom holds true today and shows that career exploration is a staple of the Milt experience that I, and all my peers, share with Billy.

William "Billy" Finnie's letters had a deep impact on me. I felt for the first time that being a Milt is truly a timeless experience, regardless of when you graduated or what student home you lived in. More than anything, I felt connected to Billy; I heard his voice through the words he put on paper and felt his personality. I saw who he was beyond his signature on the letters; he is a Milt above all things, and thus he is my brother—a brother who I watched grow up by reading 228 letters written during the span of four years. I saw a sweet boy learn, mature, and grow into a young man with dreams and aspirations for his future. Most of all, I saw every one of my MHS brothers and sisters through the words of William "Billy" Finnie.

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## **Grad's Career Sparked by**

## **COMMUNITY SERVICE**

incent Donaghey '15 is a registered nurse in the emergency department at UPMC West Shore Hospital. He believes his relief houseparents at Milton Hershey School, the Hoffmans, were instrumental in his journey to this point in his life and career. Vincent described the Hoffmans as people he could have a conversation with and "the kind of people that pushed you out of your comfort zone."

Vincent learned about MHS from a postcard mailing, and he enrolled his junior year. He said the MHS community grew on him, and he quickly decided that MHS was his "best shot" to help him escape an uncontrollable environment. He challenged himself academically and



took advantage of opportunities to get involved at the school and in the community.

He enrolled in the health sciences career pathway and fell in love with the emergency services aspect of the pathway as a junior firefighter with the Hershey Fire Department. Vincent earned the MHS Alumni Achievement Award for Community Service his senior year for his volunteer work with the fire department.

His journey toward becoming a nurse, however, did not follow a direct path. Initially, after graduating from MHS, he enrolled at Lehigh University to pursue a bioengineering degree. He realized partway through the program that engineering was not for him. He began volunteering with the fire department in the area, and they paid for him to attend classes to become an emergency medical technician (EMT). He then worked for Penn State Health Life Lion Emergency Medical Services and Critical Care Transport for a short time. Eventually, he approached



his MHS higher education support specialist about his interest in the nursing program at Harrisburg Area Community College. MHS Graduate Programs for Success staff worked with him to develop a plan. Vincent graduated from HACC in 2021 and has been working as a nurse since.

MHS prepared Vincent for the demands of a nursing program. He knew how to establish a wellstructured academic schedule and learned how to study during his senior

In the process of graduating from college, he found a job on Indeed. Having applied to be an emergency room nurse, he quickly transitioned to work in the cardiothoracic intensive care unit, where he provided postoperative care for patients who had open-heart surgery or experienced heart failure.

To better prepare himself to work in critical care, Vincent took a class on the subject. By taking the critical care class, he had the opportunity to see and understand warning signs, like heart rhythms, firsthand. He learned how to recognize and treat cases right away, and his training included handson education in addition to the classroom.

Vincent has since transitioned to working in an emergency department at UPMC West Shore. As many nurses do, he works three 12-hour shifts, which he described as both physically and mentally challenging.

Beyond his job as a nurse, Vincent volunteers as a fireman for the Upper Allen Fire Department. In addition, he and his wife juggle their work schedules to share in the care of their infant daughter.

When it comes to post-MHS decisions,

Vincent wants MHS students and alumni to not fear new things, because you might be surprised what you learn. His volunteer work as a fireman led to his earning an EMT certification, creating a good foundation for him to pursue a nursing degree, a process known as stacking credentials.

MHS college and career counselors work with students in high school to help them identify a career field and develop a plan to prepare for their career, but sometimes, through experiences after MHS, graduates discover a pathway that is a better fit for their personality, life goals, and skills.

"GPS staff are here to help recent graduates manage those types of changes and how they can best use the resources available to them to achieve their goals,"

said Sheila Ciotti, MHS director of College and Career Readiness. "For some graduates, stacking credentials, similar to what Vincent did, is a great approach to prepare for highdemand, well-paying occupations—many of which are in, but not limited to, the health care field," Sheila said.

## Alumni Recipients

## Adzua Agyapon '07, Career Accomplishment



dzua is director of policy and advocacy at the KIPP Foundation. In this role, she leads, develops, and executes strategies to advance federal and state policy that—in alignment with KIPP's mission and vision—dismantles structural barriers and puts kids on the path to opportunity. This includes advancing policies that support excellent

schools, stabilize families, and create more just communities.

Adzua previously served as a senior policy advisor for U.S. Senator Bennet, senior senator from Colorado. In this role, she oversaw, advised, and developed the senator's education, labor, and child nutrition legislative priorities. In 2018, she worked as a policy fellow through the Urban Leaders Fellowship in Atlanta. As a fellow, she worked with the Georgia Early Education Alliance for Ready Students. She also developed affordable housing policy recommendations for the Atlanta City Council.

Adzua began her career with Teach for America (TFA) in Metro Atlanta, where she worked as an elementary special education teacher. After TFA, she joined KIPP STRIVE Primary, where she was a kindergarten teacher, grade level chair, and instructional coach. In 2017, she was a candidate for the Atlanta Board of Education. As a first-time candidate, Adzua and her team planned and executed a grassroots campaign. Adzua managed five staff members and more than 50 volunteers to knock on over 2,000 doors, raise \$58,000, and defeat three candidates to advance to the runoff.

Adzua earned her bachelor's degree from Yale University, where she studied American studies with a concentration in politics and American communities. She received the MHS Alumni Achievement Award for Community Service her senior year.

## **Alphonso Nathan '05, Community Service**



Iphonso is vice president of Brightside Counseling Services and co-owner of Brightside Medical Associates, LLC. A therapist and author who speaks on Black trauma and healing, he is a celebrated gem in the black and brown mental health community. Alphonso has been featured in numerous publications, podcasts, and interviews. In

service to MHS, Alphonso volunteered as a key speaker and facilitator for an alumni mental health virtual program in January 2021. He also participated in focus groups about mental health with other alumni.

Alphonso volunteers and assists in the growth of the Black Men Heal organization, associated with Charlamagne tha God's Mental Wealth Foundation. "Kings Corner" is a free open discussion forum for black men to express their feelings with licensed mental health professionals. He also continues to work on campaigns with Taraji P. Henson's Boris Lawrence Henson Foundation, focusing on mental health and Black youth.

Alphonso has been a regular guest commentator on the numberone syndicated morning radio show in Philadelphia, "Rise Grind Morning Show," featuring Roxy Romeo, Mikey Dreads, and Mother Knows. His pseudonym, "Phonz the Therapist," is a way for him to connect with his target market and the youth of the black and brown communities. "Representation is the most important step in breaking the stigma of mental health in the black community," said Alphonso. "I am making mental health 'cool' and being the voice of the mental health culture. This generation admires Pop Culture."

Alphonso is creating a docuseries titled "Healing the Culture," that will give viewers a "fly-on-the-wall" perspective into a live therapy session with celebrities and tastemakers in the entertainment industry. His YouTube mini-series, "Phonz the Therapist Presents: Search for Self-Care," features Alphonso traveling to various places to interview innovators, creatives, and entrepreneurs who are promoting self-care and healthy living in their own way.

## **New Alumni-Funded Awards Presented During Commencement 2022**

hree new scholarships were presented to members of the Milton Hershey School Class of 2022 during the senior awards ceremony in June. The awards were created by alumni to support the new graduates in their pursuit of postsecondary education.

The Robin and Zuleika Ferrer Healthcare Leadership Award, was established in 2022 by Robin Ferrer '00 and his wife, Zuleika, for an MHS senior who plans to pursue a postsecondary degree in health science. Robin enrolled at MHS at the age of 13 after experiencing hardship and poverty in New York City. Robin's parents immigrated from Cuba and he was raised solely by his mother after his father's death in 1986. When Robin was about 12 years old, his mother was incarcerated, and she met a Catholic priest, Father Benjamin, who told her about MHS. After learning about the opportunities, Robin's mother took a taxi from New York City to Pennsylvania to tour the school. She was convinced MHS could provide what she could not. Several weeks later, Robin and his family received a phone call informing them of his acceptance. That day remains the most joyous and impactful day in Robin's life and one that would set the course for where he is now. It is out of gratitude for the impact MHS has had on Robin's life that this award was created. The first recipient of the award is Joshua Bocio '22.

The Ethos Scholarship Award was created in 2022 by Corey Dupree '09 and Johnna Tansimore '07 to benefit an MHS senior who plans to pursue a postsecondary degree in education. The scholarship was funded by proceeds from the Layers of Black History Gala, hosted by Corey and Johnna in February, which was Black History Month. The scholarship will benefit a student who found ways to serve their respective communities, specifically through engagement of youth, academic achievement, and community service during high

school. The first recipient of the award is Martrecia Zoegar '22.

The Lewis K. Webster Legacy Scholarship was created to honor the legacy and memory of Lewis Webster and his tireless effort to champion diversity in education and all the students he served for so many years at MHS. The scholarship committee members, led by Deesha Dyer '95, and consisting of Kayvon Asemani '14, Jon Branam '96, Leroy Galloway, retired MHS teacher and track coach; Stephanie McDonald '86; and Aisha Stroop '94; worked alongside the Webster family to develop several scholarships, at least one of which will benefit an MHS senior who plans to pursue a postsecondary degree in education. **Willie Phillips** died on Jan. 21, 2022. He worked at MHS from 2002 to 2015 as a custodian at Catherine Hall.


