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

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GRADUATE'S GENEROSITY

Inspired by Mr. and Mrs. Hershey

ohn E. "Jack" Thomas was born in New Jersey in 1923 before his family moved to Brooklyn, New York. When Jack was just 8 years old, he was left without parents. Several years later, after learning about new opportunities in Hershey, Pennsylvania, Jack and his two brothers enrolled at Hershey Industrial School, now known as Milton Hershey School. Spending many years as a part of the school's program, Jack graduated from high school in 1939, receiving his diploma from famous chocolatier and MHS founder, Milton S. Hershey.

After his graduation, he attended Hershey Junior College before transferring to Lafayette College, where he earned a bachelor's degree in chemistry in 1943. Upon his graduation, he began a position with Esso Chemical Company, which is now known as Exxon. While his career did not begin as he had originally anticipated, he was able to take his role to new heights by serving as the engineering officer on landing ship tanks for three years in the Pacific during World War II. As the war ended, Jack returned to his role at Exxon, ready to learn and tackle new challenges. During his career with Exxon—which included graduate studies at the University of Wisconsin—he spent his time on 13 different assignments, ranging from product development, research, technical service, and marketing.

His job allowed him to travel the world and share his work and love of learning with the communities where he lived and his family, which grew to include his wife, Jean, daughter Barbara, and son David. Jean served as an educator and found a passion for teaching children to be their greatest selves.

Upon retirement, Jack and Jean moved to Florida, ready to enjoy time in the Sunshine State. Somewhere along the way, Jack selflessly decided to donate to the Foundation for Lee County Public Schools' Take Stock in Children program, which gives those to students in need opportunities—much like those he was granted at MHS. Over the course of his lifetime, he gave \$250,000 to the foundation. His charitable contributions to the program were only magnified when he donated \$1.6 million after passing away in September 2022—at 99-years-old.

While we cannot be certain of what motivated Jack in his giving, we can imagine that he was greatly impacted by his time as a student at HIS, seeing firsthand the impact that philanthropy of this nature can have on a child's life. Mr. Hershey once thought that if the school served just 100 boys, it





would be considered a success. Jack Thomas' giving alone has broadened that impact to include hundreds more students who may never travel to Hershey, Pennsylvania, but through the power of education, will forever be a part of Mr. Hershey's life-changing legacy.



MHS Honors Alumnus for Generous Gift to Education

n May, Milton Hershey School and the Milton Hershey School Alumni Association joined the Foundation for Lee County Public Schools in Fort Myers, Florida, to honor Jack Thomas '39 and the successes within the Foundation's community.

MHS President Pete Gurt '85 joined the celebration to pay tribute to Jack Thomas,

sharing the parallels between Jack and Mr. Hershey's lives—which included donating selflessly and anonymously to education.

"Mr. and Mrs. Hershey gave so much of themselves—to many children they'd never meet—and the ripple effects of their generosity are felt today far beyond Hershey. Through Jack, that ripple effect has reached the Gulf Coast of Florida," Gurt shared.

Later that day, MHS alumni joined President Gurt and his wife, Jane, MHS employees, and MHSAA board members for a regional reception in Fort Myers. Alumni who graduated from the 1950s to the 2020s attended the event, and many of them made commitments to volunteer to support MHS students and the school's staff and student recruiting efforts. 2

Dear Alumni Brothers and Sisters:

Two of my favorite moments each year are kicking off our school year theme at Giant Center and returning to the arena to graduate another group of young men and women. These traditions remind me of what Milton Hershey School is all about.

We began the 2022-23 school year celebrating Day 1 and on June 11, the MHS community celebrated a Day WON as the Class of 2023 launched into the world. Our work last year realigned our students' commitment to the Deed of Trust, with a focus on developing strong work ethic and mutual respect. We know the important role these skills play in their success and are excited to see how they will use them.

Deeply rooted in our founders' legacy, it is no secret that our 218 youngest graduates have now joined one of the greatest alumni communities in the world. One alumnus who embraced the values of our founders and let his actions speak for themselves, was John E. "Jack" Thomas '39.

After receiving his Hershey Industrial School diploma from Milton S. Hershey, Jack went on to serve his country and have a successful career at what is now Exxon. He didn't stop there. After moving to Fort Myers, Florida in retirement, he gave back to his community in the form of several anonymous donations to education totaling nearly \$2 million.

Jack—who passed away in September 2022 at age 99—was a man of integrity, kindness, and vision. He knew the importance of education in changing a child's life. Because of Jack, 30 students in southwest Florida have received a college education, free of charge, and there are many more yet to come.

In May, I had the privilege of speaking at an event hosted by the Foundation for Lee County Public Schools—the organization which benefited from Jack's donations. We made sure to share some of our MHS magic by providing admissions materials and special chocolate bars to attendees. Our MHS Alumni Association also joined me to host an alumni event that connected Milts from around the Sunshine State.

This event reminded me that what we do at MHS reaches far beyond our Home and School. Your success becomes our success and that is what makes MHS so special. The more I learn about Jack, the more I am inspired by the incredible gift we all have received.

As we continue to grow student enrollment, we could use your support. One way each of us can help our Home and School thrive is to identify and refer families who could benefit from the gift of opportunity, or extraordinary adults who could serve our mission—especially houseparents. We all appreciate this important role in keeping the family atmosphere at MHS.

Catherine Hershey Schools for Early Learning (CHS), our early childhood education initiative, is also growing. This fall, we will open the doors of CHS Hershey to serve our first children from six weeks to five years old. MHS Welcomes Local Executives to Student-Led Leadership Conference

ilton Hershey School students were joined by executives from several of the school's Hershey entity partners and more, at the Student Government Association's (SGA) seventh Leadership Conference in April. From Michele Buck, CEO of The Hershey Company, to Leslie Lenzo, CEO and CIO of Hershey Trust Company, students had the opportunity to learn from leaders with different backgrounds.

The conference, which focused on the school year theme of Day 1 ... Day WON, was attended by nearly 200 MHS Senior Division students and five Middle Division students.

The event, which was planned and executed by Senior Division SGA students, offered attendees the opportunity to listen to two keynote speakers and attend four breakout sessions. Topics such as learning how to fail forward and embracing opportunities were explored. The conference served as an opportunity for students to connect with experts in several different career fields.

Beautifull Pyatt '23 was excited about the opportunity to learn from the presenters. "After interning at The Hershey Company, I was introduced to Michele Buck, the President and CEO, who showed me—simply by her career—that as a woman, I could break every glass ceiling in front of me," she shared.

As a part of the conference, Beautifull attended Buck's breakout session. She added, "At the SGA Leadership Conference, I was honored to attend the breakout session she led that discussed conquering your greatest fears and becoming your truest self as a leader."

Students had the opportunity to continue connecting with leaders from across partner organizations through internships, mentoring relationships, and career-focused education activities that happen year-round.

NASA Astronaut Visits MHS for an Out of This World Experience



ASA astronaut Robert (Bob) Hines traveled to Hershey, Pennsylvania, in May to visit Milton Hershey School and speak with students at the school where his grandfather, Roy Dice, was a teacher and honorary alumnus. Hines shared how his life's journey led him to be selected as a NASA astronaut on the SpaceX Crew-4 mission aboard the International Space Station (ISS).

Hines met with Elementary and Middle Division students to share what is included in astronaut training, launching into space, life on the ISS, and how it felt to return to Earth.

He also toured the school's Horticultural Center, hearing from Agricultural and Environmental Education program students about hydroponic gardens, which was a focus for Hines while in space. Senior Division students in computer science, astronomy, and culinary classes also presented to Hines about subjects they are studying which can contribute to the NASA program.

During the visit, Hines was presented with a tribute to his grandfather. Dice began teaching at the school in 1967 and retired in 1991. "My grandfather led me in my faith and my love of science and aviation," said

Hines feels a strong connection to MHS after spending time on campus as a child with his grandfather. From working in his classroom to building a small greenhouse that still stands on campus today, Hines found that MHS had a large impact on his life.



This was not the first time Hines visited with MHS students. The first was in September 2022 when Hines virtually joined students while in space. He answered student questions and offered a glimpse into life as an astronaut.

As a token of his appreciation for the opportunity, Hines gifted each division with a plaque portraying photos from his mission along with an American flag that flew with the Crew-4 mission.

MHS Memorial Day Assembly Honors Those Who Made the Ultimate Sacrifice

he Milton Hershey School community gathered in honor of those who paid the ultimate sacrifice for our nation's freedoms. This year, MHS welcomed SEAC Ramón "CZ" Colón-López, the Senior Enlisted Advisor to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, as the guest speaker.

The assembly was hosted by 2012 MHS Alumna of the Year Kimberly Elenberg '88, who retired in 2022 from a distinguished 27-year military career. She encouraged all students to serve, whether through the United States military or civilian volunteer opportunities.

Colón-López focused his remarks on why Memorial Day is held as a sacred time of remembrance. He encouraged the MHS community to always take time during Memorial Day weekend to remember Americans who gave their life defending the United States Constitution.

"We fight not because we hate what is in front of us," said Colón-López. "We fight because we love what we left behind."



MHS also paid tribute to its 57 Gold Star Alumni who gave their lives while serving in the military. This special group of individuals was honored through a presentation by 2004 MHS Alumnus of the Year and retired Lt. Gen. Richard Zilmer '70. Additionally, MHS senior Naveah Heverling '23 provided a roll call of the Gold Star Alumni.

To show appreciation for Naveah's commitment, Colón-López presented her with his personal challenge coin which includes the inscription: "Amateurs train until they get it right. Professionals train until they cannot get it wrong."

Other graduating seniors participated in the assembly through readings and leading the Pledge of Allegiance. Also, students in the Senior Division Band and New Horizons Select Choir performed several patriotic selections.

This opportunity allowed students and staff to engage with one of the highest-ranking military officials in the United States.



MHS, Hersheypark, and World of Outlaws Collaborate to Enhance Student Experiences



ilton Hershey School and local sprint car teams came together on May 11 for the first-ever Hershey Sprint Car Experience.

Prior to the event, World of Outlaws professional race car drivers visited MHS Career and Technical Education classes. Middle Division students showed Outlaw drivers Brock Zearfoss and Carson Macedo a small lawnmower engine they took apart and reassembled.

"If we can just get one kid interested in motorsports, that's one more we haven't had," Zearfoss said. "The class really enjoyed learning more about our world."

Senior Division students learned lessons in history, auto mechanics, and physics, from Outlaws drivers Gio Scelzi and Logan Schuchart.

The drivers shared their journeys to joining a professional racing organization, and together with students explored the unique composition of sprint cars compared to other race cars. Finally, the special visitors talked to students about life outside of the driver's seat, sharing lessons on mental preparation and the importance of teamwork.

When class dismissed, hundreds of students headed to Hersheypark Stadium for the Hershey Sprint Car Experience, which celebrated modern-day racing while paying tribute to those who raced there 84 years

ago. Hersheypark Stadium was once home to the Hershey Stadium Speedway, which opened May 18, 1939.

The Hershey Sprint Car Experience featured professional sprint car drivers, midget cars that once raced at Hershey Stadium Speedway, and quarter-midget cars that are used to introduce young children to racing. The event also exposed race fans to the educational and employment opportunities available at MHS.

"The partnership between MHS and World of Outlaws is amazing. We have a unique program at MHS where we teach our kids all about careers, opportunities, trajectories, and what you need to do to accomplish lifelong dreams," said Nadine Krempa, MHS Senior Director of Enrollment Management.

Seniors Become Certified Nursing Assistants Before Graduation

ine members of the Milton Hershey School Class of 2023 reached a milestone toward achieving postsecondary success by becoming Certified Nursing Assistants (CNAs). As seniors, they were enrolled in the school's Health Science career pathway. The pathway prepares high school students for healthrelated careers.

Through the MHS Career and Technical Education (CTE) program, students can gain certifications and college credits. Through a partnership with Harrisburg Area Community College, students completed a CNA program that included classroom instruction, hands-on learning, and clinical experience.

In the spring, after graduating from the program, all nine students passed a written test and skills exam to earn their certification.



"Providing our students with career exposure helps them to determine if this career path is a good fit," said MHS Director of College and Career Readiness Sheila Ciotti. "There are many benefits to the credential and completing the program, whether students wish to enter the workforce directly or go to college."

Hershey entity partners are further supporting MHS students to achieve success. Through a partnership with Penn State Health, the new CNAs gained realworld experience.

"We got a behind-the-scenes look through different rotations at Penn State Health Milton S. Hershey Medical Center," said Anna Allen '23. "When most people think of a health science career, they think of being a nurse or a doctor. It's just really cool to see the different options."

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, overall employment of CNAs is anticipated to grow by 5 percent between 2021 and 2031 with 220,200 projected job openings each year.

While still students at MHS, two of the new CNAs used their certifications. They began part-time employment at Country Meadows in Hershey prior to graduation and planned to expand on their careers from CNAs to pursue degrees in nursing.

HERSHEYS' LEGACY

to Create Social Impact

f there's one thing that influenced Michele Y. Smith '90 during her time at Milton Hershey School, it's the legacy of Milton and Catherine Hershey's philanthropy that gave her a chance to succeed far beyond what she thought was possible.

"I don't think I'd be where I am today without their culture of philanthropy," said Michele. "It continues to give back in multitudes, and what [Mr. Hershey] doesn't even know is how much he's driven such a social impact around the world. I am a product of that social impact. You can see it through my career and where I am today; it has shaped everything that I have done."

Michele enrolled at MHS in fourth grade, joining her brother as a student. Her mother was raising the two on her own in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, while working full time and pursuing a degree. Michele's mother decided to enroll her children at the school to give them each the opportunity to grow individually and to strengthen their familyeven allowing her to earn several degrees.

While at MHS, Michele was influenced by many adults in her life, both teachers and houseparents, many who she remains in contact with.

"They don't just leave you when you graduate," she shared. "They follow you for life through all your ups and downs and achievements. They're my family."

One of the adults that shaped her life was Ady Shepard, her business and finance teacher. Through a business audit projectwhere students created their own business and had to carefully review the financials-Michele developed her love of business.

After graduating from MHS and receiving a finance degree from Indiana University of Pennsylvania, she began her career at a financial firm and later transitioned to United Airlines in the days before 9/11. This required her to tap into a skill learned at MHSresilience.

"I've been through some very life-changing things that have happened to the world," she said. "When I look back now ... I think that's what a Spartan is. It's our spirit. It's our resilience. It's never giving up-we're always facing forward. We all come from challenging backgrounds, but what we've learned is that our experiences shape us, they mold us, and they make us better."

With the foundation she received at MHS and her professional experiences, Michele excelled in her career in finance roles within the hospitality and travel industryorganizations that enabled her to see the world. Eventually, she settled in Seattle, Washington, becoming the chief financial officer for the Woodland Park Zoo.

"When I started at the zoo, I was enticed by its mission because it was really focusing on community," Michele said. "The employees reminded me of MHS students. They were very passionate about what they do. They were a family."



Michele's experience in travel and hospitality allowed her to look at things from a different perspective as she reflected on the impact the zoo could have on the community as a whole.

With 1.4 million visitors from around the globe, the zoo is one of the largest attractions in Seattle, requiring Michele to use the perspective she gained while becoming a world citizen to develop the most impactful experience for every visitor. Focusing on bringing animals from around the world ensures the global experience is accessible to marginalized communities.

Outside of her formal career, Michele is also involved in her community. She is on the board of Mary's Place, a nonprofit that helps women and families experiencing homelessness, highlighting a campaign to ensure no child sleeps outside in Seattle. Michele also partners with the Downtown Seattle Association to make sure the streets are safe and works to give back to local small business owners, mentoring women along the way.

"I am a product of philanthropy," she said. "I understand the importance of this work and for me, the mission of where I am and building a purpose-driven culture that's going to help spark and change lives for others is following the same work of our MHS founders."

Continuing her work in nonprofit, Michele recently accepted a new role as chief executive officer of the Museum of Pop Culture (MoPOP) in Seattle.

Beginning as the Experience Museum created by Paul Allen, the co-founder of Microsoft, the museum has grown in its mission to allow Seattle residents and tourists to see and touch various types of culture such as art, gaming, music, and more. Just as she did at Woodland Park Zoo, Michele wants to ensure that marginalized communities have access to cultural experiences locally and globally through MoPOP exhibits.

"I want to make sure that MoPOP continues to be an example of the future of art and culture, while driving social impact for people to learn from one another and their cultures," said Michele.

As she looks to the future as the CEO of MoPOP and continuing her work in her community as an advocate and mentor, it all comes back to her time at MHS.

"For the parents that are considering MHS, it is an opportunity of a lifetime to change their child's life," Michele said. "It's an opportunity that they should take because you can see the product that has come out of MHS. It is also a fierce network of champions, supported by the mission of a school and its founders." 2

New Life for the Hershey Community Building

ecently, Milton Hershey School announced the purchase of the Hershey Community Building at 14 East Chocolate Avenue. The building will be used to support the school as it expands to help more children reach their full potential. The historic building will provide offices and meeting spaces for MHS and Catherine Hershey Schools for Early Learning (CHS). In the future, the Hershey Community Archives and MHS archival collection will also share the space.

Plans made in 1915 for a grand Community Building were set aside because of World War I and the death of Catherine Hershey. The Hershey Press reported on Nov. 4, 1915, that, "Hershey moves steadily from one thing to another, and all are the ideas of Mr. M.S. Hershey." During the Great Depression in the 1930s and a decrease in production at the chocolate factory, Mr. Hershey created jobs by embarking on his great building campaign. Plans for the building were re-activated.

The building, finished in September 1932 and dedicated on Sept. 3, 1933, became the center of the town's life.

Inside the building, the Hershey Theatre's grand style reflects Mr. and Mrs. Hershey's travels. The inner foyer's arched tile ceiling, patterned after St. Mark's Cathedral in Venice, Italy, offers a canopy of gold. The main level of the theatre enables guests to feel like they are in Venice with winged lions, the city's symbol, looking down and a fire curtain with a picture of the Grand Canal.

When the Community Building was completed, Hershey Industrial School (HIS) held worship services in the theater, and beginning in 1935, Commencement was held in the building, except for two years during World War II and in 1953 when there was a joint Commencement ceremony between MHS, HIS and Hershey Junior College. Commencement was later held at Founders Hall when it opened in 1970.

With the growth of HIS, in 1933 seventh and eighth grades attended classes in the Community Building. The building was also home to Hershey Junior College.

It is exciting that the iconic building will have a new life and purpose in the heart of Hershey.



HIS Contributes to the War Effort in Many Ways



uring World War II, Hershey Industrial School contributed to the war effort in a variety of ways. By the war's end, more than 1,000 former students and alumni served in the armed forces.

The auto mechanic and welding shops were converted to aircraft repair, the school raised over \$5,000 in war stamps and bonds, HIS farms increased production of vegetables and milk in cooperation with the Farm Defense Program, and students made model airplanes to help the air raid spotters in the Junior-Senior High School tower

identify planes. People from the community volunteered to staff the tower 24/7 for two years because of the school's proximity to the Middletown Air Depot (now Harrisburg International Airport).

Beginning in the spring of 1942, as part of the Philadelphia U.S. Signal Corps National Defense Training Program, 54 men took classes at HIS in electricity, machine shop practice, and radio work. Women took machine shop courses to be employed at the Middletown Air Depot. All classes were held after school time, from 4 p.m. to midnight. The first class of women trainees in machine tool operation graduated in April 1943 and another group followed. Training continued over the summer as they made precision machine parts for airplanes and tools used for airplane engine repair.

In a letter of thanks, Harry D. Kolb, Major of the Air Corps in Middletown, shared that the school's training was, "indicated in the technical knowledge and manipulative skills now shown by these women trainees. Your wholehearted cooperation has made possible the success of this phase of the training program, and you can justly feel proud of the contribution the Hershey Industrial School has made to National Defense." More than 80 years later, the school remains proud of its contribution to the war effort.

Remembering Berta Harm

omen have been an integral part of Milton Hershey School from its earliest days. Beginning with Catherine Hershey's direct involvement, the school benefited from a woman's touch and strong influence. Nearly 100 years ago in 1923, as the school grew, Superintendent George Copenhaver hired a young woman, Berta Harm, to teach third grade.

After a few years, Miss Harm began teaching sixth grade, and it was in her class that the student-produced School Industrialist/ Spartan was created. The boys wanted to start a school newspaper and began writing news articles in long-hand, hanging them on the hallway walls. Mr. Copenhaver noticed their efforts, and during the fall of 1933, the first issue of the Boy Industrialist (later the School Industrialist, then Spartan) was published.

In 1930, after continuing her education, Miss Harm assumed the role of school psychologist in the Admissions Department. In that role, Miss Harm developed admissions procedures, interviewed, and tested prospective students, and traveled about the country to visit the boys and their families in their homes. In an interview after her retirement, Miss Harm recalled traveling about 1,500 miles per month. She drove alone through snow, ice, and mud, surviving flat

tires, detours, and attempting to find towns not on any map-all before the days of cell phones and navigation systems. During her tenure, Miss Harm was responsible for the admission of over 1,500 new students, and school enrollment increased from 400 to 1,100.

Gasoline rationing during World War II ended Miss Harm's traveling days, and from then on, she conducted interviews and admission testing at the Junior-Senior High School (now Catherine Hall). In 1950, she was named assistant principal of the Fanny B. Hershey Elementary School—the school's first female administrator. She remained there until her retirement in 1953.

Miss Harm was named an honorary alumna in 1954 and memorialized in 1999 with the naming of the Berta Harm Enrollment & Family Relations Center in former student home Habana. She is remembered for her service to the school and her comforting assurance to families that allowed them to give their boys the opportunity to enroll at the school.



Your Memories Update

he Department of School History is continuing the multiyear project to modernize the school's archival collection and has begun the process of digitizing items. Included in the first wave are class scrapbooks. Many scrapbooks contain photographs that do not exist elsewhere. Also included are a Glee Club scrapbook and posters, students' vocational trade drawing books, letters written home from students in the 1930s, Milton S. Hershey's Silver Beaver Scouting Award Certificate, deeds signed by Milton Hershey, and other items important to the school's history. 2

THERE IS NO AGE LIMIT IN SERVICE:

MHS Ambassador Ralph Greer '46

n an Oct. 4, 1942, article in the Philadelphia Inquirer titled There's No Age Limit in Service to Country, Milton S. Hershey shared, "There are no limitations to what age can do. An interest in something new triumphs over the calendar any day." Ralph Greer '46 is proof of that.

In the spring of 2015, Ralph made inquiries about Mr. Hershey's thoughts when starting the school, and the Department of School History provided him with information that gave insight to Mr. Hershey's reasoning. That inquiry began a long relationship between Ralph and the Department of School History to spread the word about MHS.

Ralph enrolled in Hershey Industrial School at the age of six. He studied in the commercial program, was active in the Glee Club, Industrialist publication, and Acropolis yearbook staff. He credits his houseparents at farmhome Men-O with

teaching him work ethic and the commitment to complete a job. He remembers "little kindnesses that the houseparents did that made you realize that they cared."

After graduation, Ralph attended Hershey Junior College and enlisted in the United States Army, serving in Korea as a court reporter. He then had a successful career in insurance in Colorado.

Ralph volunteered at his church to give a presentation on Milton S. Hershey and his alma mater with help from fellow alumnus, John Russell '62. After hearing many people ask, "why haven't we ever heard this story before," Ralph realized that in his retirement community of about 2,000, "an awful lot of people never heard of [the school]. All they knew was HERSHEY'S Chocolate." That led to extensive preparation for presentations at his retirement community's Learners Classes.

In addition to quotes from Mr. Hershey, Ralph requested current information about the school, in order that his presentations were up-to-date and accurate. He requested information on summer and vacation programming for the students, and culled data from the MHS website and YouTube page. Ralph gave four different presentations, one on Milton S. Hershey, the development of the school from 1909 to 1930, the vocational program at the Junior-Senior High School, now Catherine Hall, and finally a session talking about MHS today.



Ralph's first class was on Sept. 25, 2016 and continued until spring 2023. He also wrote articles promoting MHS and Mr. Hershey's generosity for his community newsletter. The people who attended his classes were amazed to hear about the school. Ralph shared that when chatting with a woman at his medical clinic, "I somehow got onto the subject of chocolate, and Mr. Hershey's successes and legacy. She wanted to know more and thought she might know some families with children that would qualify to attend MHS. The school sent me several packets and I gave her one. I am interested if she lets me know of any successes with that. Another resident works in a school and wants one of those to take to teachers."

Ralph planted seeds about MHS to many people over the years. "What I tried to



emphasize in the classes was that there was a man and his wife, who had no children, who gave away all of their money to help kids."

When asked what impact the classes had on him, Ralph replied, "I was never an outgoing person, and it took me a little while to get up the courage to do this...I was never one to be out in the front, but I just decided the message had to be told. So, I had quite a bit of good feelings when the people coming back to me were thanking me for the presentation and so forth."

In his retirement community, Ralph Greer is known as the Hershey Man and is a great example that there is no limit to serving.


"We have embraced adversity head on, and MHS has erased the limits, excuses, and boundaries to us pursuing our dreams," she added. 🙎

The annual awards, introduced in 1997, honor graduates and seniors for academic, career, and community service accomplishments.

Jamison Langguth '06 and Emily Witmer '23 were honored for career accomplishment; Diane Ford '13 and Lionel Torres '23 were honored for academic excellence; and Kwasi Abrokwa '00 and Damien Lambert '23 were honored for community service.

ALUMNI RECIPIENTS



Jamison Langguth '06, **Career Accomplishment**

Jamison started his career in clinical research analyzing EEG waveforms and has worked his way through clinical operations into management. He is currently senior manager of health strategy innovation at Stanford University's Center for Clinical Research. In his role, he works toward creating funds, programs, and supporting team science on the ground to ensure that health innovations become new standards of care.

He has worked on clinical trials with child and adult populations across a variety of disciplines including space and sleep medicine, digital health, cardiology, neurology, addiction, oncology, regenerative medicine, and infectious disease. His commercialization experience mainly involves creating and launching therapeutic, medical device, and digital health companies.

Jamison serves on two boards and volunteers as an entrepreneur-in-residence (EIR) for two programs. He is a board member and co-founder of Aero Therapeutics, which helps physicians treat respiratory issues in low-resource settings with the company's sustainable, rugged, and affordable medical devices. He recently joined the board of Terra Firma International, which strives to break intergenerational poverty. He volunteers as an EIR and Silliman College Fellow for Yale University and as an EIR Mentor with OneRise's WEF Global Shapers Initiative. OneRise is a non-profit initiative that aims to level the playing field by connecting immigrant founders to the knowledge, skills, and networks needed to succeed.

Jamison earned his undergraduate degree in psychology at Drexel University. He earned his first master's degree in education policy from the University of Pennsylvania and his second in health management from Harvard University. Finally, he completed his fellowship in life science entrepreneurship at Yale University.



Diane Ford, J.D. '13, Academic Excellence

Diane is a native of Brooklyn, New York, but she calls many places home. During her time at MHS, Diane received the Most Nearly Ideal Senior Award. After graduation, she moved to North Carolina where she attended Campbell University. In 2017, she graduated with a bachelor's degree in economics, and in spring 2022, she graduated with a Juris-Doctorate Degree from Campbell Law

Diane's legal education led her to serve as an extern for the North Carolina Community College System, Legal Aid of North Carolina, and the Attorney's Office for City of Durham.

A former member of Campbell Law's distinguished advocacy program, Diane competed in the National Civil Trial Competition and Annual Duberstein Bankruptcy Moot Court Competition. When Diane was president of Campbell Law's Black Law Student Association, it earned Chapter of the Year, a celebrated award among the southern region of black law students.

Diane is currently a law clerk for Whitaker & Hamer PLLC and recently passed the North Carolina Bar Exam in March 2022.



Kwasi Abrokwa '00, **Community Service**

Kwasi is the director of talent at The Management Center, a nonprofit based in Washington, D.C. that helps social justice leaders build and run equitable, sustainable, and results-driven organizations. Prior to joining The Management Center, Kwasi was the talent manager for Harrisburg University of Science and Technology, leading all talent and recruitment efforts locally in Harrisburg and Philadelphia, and internationally in Abu Dhabi and Latin America. Outside of his profession, Kwasi enjoys coaching student-athletes in wrestling, a sport he first learned at MHS where he a was successful wrestler. He was a volunteer coach at Palmyra High School before becoming head coach of the MHS Middle Division wrestling program.

Kwasi's commitment to service can be seen in various areas. As a member of the Zeta Theta Lambda Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Incorporated, he has been involved with initiatives that focus on voter education and registration, conducting programming for students who would like to attend college, and helping to provide college scholarships. He has been involved with providing meals for families in the Harrisburg area on Thanksgiving and donating and delivering hundreds of toys to families over the Christmas holiday.

MHS Students Explore Opportunities to Become Future Ready at Postsecondary Fair



uring the spring, Milton Hershey School Senior Division students explored more than 40 secondary options available to them.

The school's Graduate Programs for Success Division hosted a Postsecondary Fair that connected students with representatives from two- and four-year college programs, the military, and local and regional employers. Students had the ability to talk one-on-one with their guests and discuss how to best position themselves for long-term success.

Key components of the career readiness process at MHS are self-awareness and career awareness. Events like postsecondary fairs help students become aware of the range of careers within industries they are interested in. MHS college and career counselors play an integral role within this process, working closely with high school students to develop career preparation plans that align with students' personalities, skills, and aptitudes.

Isis Stewart, an MHS junior, spoke to recruiters with the Pennsylvania National Guard and United States Marines.


