It's also special to introduce my two daughters and husband to the place that raised me. I am grateful to be connected to our alumni network. We are a community of diverse, dedicated, and dynamic individuals who understand that positive intent paired with action can change the world. Recently, my family ran into an elementary girls' student home at Wildwood Park. When I told them I was a Milt too, they exclaimed, "She has the ring!" I replied, "Yes, I do, and I wear it with pride!"

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MAU FIRE Destroyed His Home but Not His Dreams

n June 10, 2023, Inoke Taufa '23 walked across the stage at GIANT Center to proudly accept his Milton Hershey School diploma. Shortly afterward, he traveled home to Hawaii to spend time with his family before returning to Pennsylvania to continue his education at Millersville University.

Two months later, on Aug. 8, winddriven wildfires destroyed more than 2,200 structures on the island of Maui. It was the fifth deadliest wildland fire in United States history and the worst natural disaster in Hawaii's history, according to a blog published by the U.S. Federal Emergency Management Agency.

That orange and red demon wiped out Inoke's family home, his village, his island, and nearly stole his dreams. All he had was destroyed in the fire—including his computer, phone, birth certificate, and clothing. As the oldest child in his immediate family, Inoke felt compelled to stay with his mother and four siblings. Inoke's other sister, who also was enrolled at MHS, was already back on campus.

Inoke and his family worked hard to get back on their feet again. But his dreams of going to college seemed to go up in flames.

What Inoke had not anticipated, however, was the determination of the MHS community to rally in support of him, his family, and his dreams.

When alumni and staff at MHS became aware of Inoke's situation, they worked feverishly to get him back in time for the start of his freshman year at Millersville. Many answered the call to help Inoke pursue his goal of continuing his education to build a life for himself and his family back home. "The Milton Hershey School family was eager to rally around Inoke to provide for his needs during this challenge," said Lorraine (Hissick) Romberger '83, MHS director of alumni relations.

Inoke returned to Hershey with a pair of shorts, a t-shirt, and a couple other items he was given back on Maui after the fires. Unsure of what lie ahead, Inoke also began to understand he would not have to pursue his dream alone.

"MHS staff, the Dearden Foundation, and the MHS Alumni Association organized to support Inoke with transportation, clothing, food, and college supplies," Romberger said.

Inoke came to MHS in eighth grade. During his time at the school, he always seemed to have a smile on his face. He has a personality that tends to make others around him feel happy. That personality

allowed Inoke to make connections that would last much longer than he could have imagined. Compassionate members of the MHS community gave him everything he would need to start his college career, not for glory or praise but to support the young man they had come to respect.

Grateful for the support of the MHS community, Inoke remained concerned about his family back home. When he talks about that time, Inoke appears to be drifting back in his mind, reliving the nightmare. He said it was tough in the beginning, with the challenges of starting a new school and all the nuances that accompanied the move, including having to replace several legal documents. Being the Spartan he is, Inoke bravely faced each challenge and broke through to continue moving forward. With his freshman year of college complete, he is doing much better now.

"Inoke is a great representation of a Milt with determination, hard work, and strong values," said Deb Turnpaugh, MHS regional admissions recruiter who has worked closely with Inoke and his family.

Inoke's mother learned about MHS from her employer who knew she was looking for a better life for Inoke and his siblings. She knew about Kamehameha School in Hawaii but had concerns about his possible enrollment because she was born on another island. She investigated several residential schools and ultimately selected MHS. Following in the footsteps of Inoke and his sister, Felisita Vasquez '24, are two younger siblings, Salote Vasquez, a rising 10th grader, and Saravia Vasquez, a rising eighth grader, who were enrolled after the fire. When Inoke arrived for his MHS admissions interview, he saw snow for the first time and learned how to make a snowball. Upon enrollment, Inoke's first houseparents were MHS alumnus John Kirk '77 and his wife, Jennifer, at student home Adriatic.

Inoke said there were many adults involved in his life at MHS, and there are several who had a memorable impact on him, including Jenny Slatt, education and human services teacher; Matthew Edris, social studies teacher; Jennifer Hendry, learning resource specialist; Molly Bechtel, high school English teacher; and houseparents Grant and Valerie Powers and Kenneth Wilson and Taisha Tarvin-Wilson. In addition to the impact they had on him during his time at MHS, he credits them with helping him become the person he is today.

Never asking for anything nor expecting anyone to go out of their way for him, Inoke appreciates the gift of MHS, including the opportunity to accrue Continuing Education Scholarship funds and the gracious support extended to him and his family by the MHS community. Having witnessed other college students worry about paying back loans and keeping up with paperwork for grants, Inoke realizes he does not have that burden and can focus on his education.

It is in our darkest times that the light shines more brightly. As a young man, Inoke has gone through one of the darkest of times a person can face, only to realize the value of MHS and those who work here. With the support of an MHS education and the MHS community, Inoke can continue striving toward his dreams. The light at the end of the tunnel for Inoke is once again bright.

Milton Hershey School **Theme Homes Help Students Perfect Skills**

esidents of two Milton Hershey School student homes share a common interest in saving lives. Student home Union Canal and student home Grant were designated as first responder theme homes for the 2023-24 school year. In their first year, theme homes group students with similar talents, skills, classes, and schedules so their schoolwork can be reinforced.

Rodney and Amy Sonderman, houseparents of student home Union Canal, believe theme homes help them better focus their attention on students' needs because they share interests. The students also gain leadership skills by helping each other achieve breakthroughs.

"The kids who are doing very well can be challenged and pushed farther," Sonderman said. "The ones who are struggling, we can pick up and push farther."

Rodney Sonderman also serves as deputy chief of the Hershey Volunteer Fire Department. Some of the students in his home also volunteer with the department.

"Having student volunteers serve as junior firefighters gives the adults the opportunity to focus on the fire while the students carry ladders and open hydrants," Rodney said.

The students' work is also a benefit to the MHS community. Eleventh grader Jaydiel Garcia has received two life-saving awards for helping students experiencing a medical emergency. For Garcia, the experience has given him the opportunity to fulfill a lifelong goal.

The Sondermans are in their 25th year of houseparenting at MHS. They believe the new theme homes will give them the opportunity to make a larger impact on their students' lives.

"If I go back and look at the hundreds of graduates we have had, the ones we have had the most impact on are the ones who were involved with the fire department," Rodney said. 💈

Milton Hershey School Students Excel in NASA H.U.N.C.H. Challenge

wo Milton Hershey School students stepped out of their comfort zones this spring and experienced a Breakthrough moment. As a result, they realized their work is truly out of this world. MHS Culinary Arts Teacher Samantha Katzaman's Nutrition and Food Science class placed in the top 10 schools in the nation in the NASA H.U.N.C.H. Culinary Challenge.

Katzaman and senior students Felisita Vasquez and Zhawna Freeland traveled to Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas in mid-April to compete in the finals. For Felisita and Zhawna, being members of a class that earned such a high accomplishment was a team Breakthrough and a personal one.

Neither of them had much culinary arts experience before this year. Both decided to try something new by taking a class not required for their Career and Technical Education career pathway. "I love jumping around and trying different opportunities at MHS,"

Felisita said.

For Zhawna, the drive to take Katzaman's class was much more practical. "I never knew how to use a knife before. I figured it was something I should know," Zhawna said.

Participants were required to create a savory breakfast dish featuring a vegetable that astronauts could eat in space. Zhawna proposed a chickpea and vegetable scramble, which almost fit the challenge's nutritional requirements. However, to succeed, the class first had to do some problem-solving.

The H.U.N.C.H. Challenge required the class to submit a research paper outlining microgravity's effects on the human body and how food is processed in outer space. The students created a video to help judges understand their dish and the process they used to create it.

"Judges seemed impressed that we brought the actual freeze-dried version of the dish they created," Katzaman said. "One of the food scientists said she was actually working on a similar dish herself." 🙎

Andrea and Matthew Cedro's careers were built on these principles before becoming houseparents at Milton Hershey School in 2018. Today, they support elementary-age boys. In this second career, they teach the boys life skills, encourage them to try new things, and always bring their previous work experiences into the student home.

Andrea and Matt, originally from the Pittsburgh area, had very specific career trajectories and personal goals after they graduated from college. Andrea worked on a cruise ship to satisfy her desire to travel the world. Matt climbed his way up in the culinary industry.

After Matt saw a job description for MHS houseparents in an email, he applied immediately and encouraged Andrea

to do the same. The second career was not hard to sell to Andrea as it checked all of the boxes that they were looking for-proximity to family, purpose-driven work, and the opportunity to continue to work together. The skills and talents they gained in their previous professions even transferred in a very positive way in the student home.

"With Matt's experience in busy kitchens, he brings a calm demeanor and is always looking for efficiencies. I bring an expertise in the administrative side and neither of us are ever stressed about the inventory management and have fun cooking together," Andrea said.

Caring for children may seem like an unusual career shift, but some of life's greatest adventures are unplanned.

"Timing is everything in our career journey and we know that everything

happens for a reason, whatever the reason. In it all, you have to be open to leaps of faith," explained the couple. "We hold on to our 'why'—which is we love parenting and we love working together. We have a mindset to do this amazing job, but just like all jobs, it can be hard." 💈

Milton Hershey School Student, Campus Safety Officer Save Life



man is alive today thanks to the quick and professional actions of a Milton Hershey School student and Campus Safety Officer.

An avid cyclist was biking through the MHS campus in mid-May when he got dizzy and lost his vision. He pulled over, sat under a tree, and waved for help. Student Intern Marilyn Purcell '24 was riding along with Campus Safety Officer Taylor Heisey when she noticed the man and alerted Heisey. He stopped, called 911, and cared for the cyclist until paramedics arrived. Medical personnel did not mince words-if the cyclist had waited any longer for help, he would not have lived to thank those who came to his aid. For Purcell and Heisey, the response was

simply putting their training into action. "It was just a regular day of doing my

job of watching campus to see what is going on," Purcell, a member of the MHS Class of 2024, said.

The man wrote a letter to Campus Safety Director Rick Gilbert expressing his appreciation to everyone at MHS who helped save his life. Gilbert presented Marilyn and Heisey with commendations for their actions, an honor that is rarely awarded.

"This would be a memorial service, not a commendation ceremony, if it were not for that young lady," the man said after meeting his lifesavers.

Additionally, Campus Safety Supervisor Patrick McKenna knew the man had someone at home who would be waiting for him to return from his ride. After unsuccessful attempts to call his wife, McKenna drove to their home to share the news and return his bicycle.

For Heisey, the opportunity to connect with MHS students like Marilyn makes his job as a campus safety officer special. MHS students can participate in real-life, handson internship experiences. The internships match each student's chosen career pathway in the School's award-winning Career and Technical Education program. Through the program, students also learn employability skills, like teamwork, time management, and organization.

ouseparenting runs in the family for alumni Yvonne (Smith) '04 and Nick Serrano '04, and Eric Holland '14 and Anna Kauffman '14, who recently returned to Milton Hershey School as fulltime flex houseparents.

Anna, Eric, and Nick are MHS lifers who enrolled in first grade or earlier. Yvonne enrolled in ninth grade. Eric and Yvonne are brother and sister. When Eric was a student. Yvonne visited him at MHS and took him out during breaks for visits. She was like a mother to him.

Through the years, the four talked about returning someday to MHS to work as houseparents. Anna described her desire to be a houseparent as a calling and an opportunity to give back to MHS, one that she had considered since she was 18.

The two couples were surprised, though, to learn that they each had applied to be houseparents at about the same time and ended up in the same cohort for relief houseparent training and for flex houseparent training. Flex houseparenting is the first step toward becoming full-time houseparents assigned to a permanent student home.

Each couple emphasized the importance of being in a good place with their marriage and family before taking on the responsibility of houseparenting. Yvonne and Nick have two daughters, one who has

Down Syndrome. Anna and Eric have one daughter who is a toddler.

Houseparenting is so much more than a job—it's a purpose, and the four embrace it. They consider it a way of life and an opportunity to create a family environment like they experienced for current students. Years after graduating, they continue to remain close with some of their former houseparents and MHS staff who had an impact on their lives as students and continue to consider them to be role models.

Anna talked fondly about her relationship with her former houseparents

and MHS staff member Charlene Ferrick, whom she considers a mentor. As a student, Anna met Charlene when she worked in the Home Life office. Charlene now works in the MHS President's Office. Anna laughed when she said she visited Ms. Ferrick nearly every day during high school. The two still stay in touch.

While a student, Eric established a close relationship with his houseparents, Daniel and Vanessa Medlin, a relationship that has grown stronger through the years. Together, Eric and Anna consider the Medlins extended family. Eric and Anna dated during high school, married shortly after graduating from MHS, and when their daughter Emma was born several years later, the Medlins became like grandparents to her. The Medlins continue to serve as houseparents at Middle Division student home Carousel.

Yvonne learned from her houseparents,

the Garcias, that the key to creating a family-like atmosphere is to strike a balance between holding students accountable and allowing them to be kids. She and Nick strive to help students become their best selves by providing a balance between accountability and allowing them to grow as individuals. She described it as planting the seeds for life skills to help grow good and successful people.

As a student, Nick played soccer and participated in track and field. He still runs and plays soccer with a group of housefathers every week. He also worked as a summer intern at the school's last cow farm. It is not uncommon to see Nick running and playing games with students outside a student home. Having considered MHS his home, Nick said it is important to him to help create that

atmosphere for current students. Just days before MHS Commencement 2024, Nick reflected on his own graduation experience. He said he can relate to the mixed emotions experienced by many recent MHS graduates.

student experiences and relationships with staff allow them to bring a unique perspective to houseparenting. Since returning to MHS, they continue to learn from staff members who serve as role models for them. While they acknowledge there have been changes at MHS since they were students, they said the commitment to creating a supportive home and school for students remains. student homes as full-time houseparents. William E. Dearden '40, A Dream Fulfilled

uring the Great Depression, enrollment at Hershey Industrial School (now Milton Hershey School) increased three-fold. By 1935, the School expanded to more than 800 students, one of which was 13-year-old William "Bill" Dearden, the only MHS graduate to serve as chief executive officer of The Hershey Company.

After the loss of Dearden's mother, his father struggled to find a job and provide for his family. Coming to HIS provided stability for both William and his younger brother. Having three meals a day, good clothing, and a stable home was a significant change for him. As he later stated, "Mr. Hershey built a bridge for those of us who have been fortunate enough to be one of 'his boys.'"

While at school, Dearden was involved in everything from athletics to glee club and graduated at the top of his class. He believed that participating in athletics taught him how to build a great team, and that one person cannot do it all. The idea that a team is only as great as the sum of its parts is the philosophy that would later follow him into his own career.

After his graduation in 1940, Dearden attended Hershey Junior College for one year before accepting an athletic scholarship to Albright College. Following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, and the United States declaration of war, he enlisted in the Navy in 1942 and was sent to Harvard Business School as a part of his military service.

By the early 1950s, he found himself back at MHS as the assistant placement director. Dearden felt that he owed a great debt to both Mr. Hershey and the school community because of all the

opportunities the school gave him. When discussing coming back to the School, he said, "One of the reasons for my returning to my alma mater was my strong feeling toward the School and what it did for me as a student. "

In 1957, Dearden accepted a position to work as the assistant to John J. Gallagher, chairman of the board at The Hershey Chocolate Corporation. From there, climbing the corporate ladder, he led The Hershey Company through difficult challenges that would

to experience the new special exhibit exploring the life of William "Bill" Dearden '40—the first and only graduate to run The Hershey Company—at The Hershey Story Museum.

set the company on the path to success. He built departments from the ground up, implemented new products, created a marketing department, and revamped sales while diversifying the company's business interests. Eventually, as CEO, he launched Hershey Chocolate into the number one confectionary firm in the United States. He is also credited for saving High Point Mansion, Milton Hershey's home, when he turned it into the new corporate offices after there was talk of selling or even demolishing it.

One thing William Dearden never forgot was the ultimate mission of The Hershey Chocolate Corporation, which was keeping Milton Hershey's dream alive through MHS. He understood the importance of creating a modern strategic plan with positive outcomes which would lay the groundwork for a successful company and, in turn, a successful school. In addition, as a member of the MHS Board of Managers, he was vocal in his determination that the School should integrate and supported the 1968 decision to include boys of all races and then later to include girls.

From humble beginnings, William Dearden became the first MHS graduate to lead The Hershey Chocolate Corporation and fulfill Milton's dream that one day one of "his boys" would run his chocolate factory.

Hershekoko: A Town Was Born

s Milton S. Hershey set out to create his chocolate factory, he also set out to build a town where there were once only dairy farms and a small village. Mr. Hershey had a dream, not just of a new business venture, but of a top-notch transit system, affordable housing, and plenty of recreational opportunities for his employees to enjoy. He was not just creating a town; he was

investing in the future. Building a town from scratch, though, had its difficulties. It took time to build

the trolley system, park, restaurants, and places to stay for both employees and tourists. Mr. Hershey spared no expense and said he was prepared to invest \$1 million to make sure the town was perfect.

There was one aspect of the town, however, that Mr. Hershey put in the hands of his lawyer, John Snyder, and that was applying for authorization of a new post office with a name so people could begin receiving mail. Snyder decided that creating the name would become a contest, open to the public, with the best name winning a \$100 prize. Thousands of names were submitted from Beansdale to Oasis, and even St. Milton. The public had a field day with the variety of names they submitted, and there was passionate excitement as they voted for their favorites.

Then, on Sept. 1, 1904, Mrs. T.K. Doyle of Wilkes-Barre took home the prize money for the winning name: HERSHEKOKO.

If you are wondering why you have never heard of the town Hershekoko, it is because almost immediately after the winning name was selected there were many who protested it. The United States Post Office complained that the name was "too commercial." In fact, even the name itself could not be properly decided with some newspapers naming it Hershekoko and others claiming it was Hersheykoko.

After much thought, the most agreed upon name naturally became "Hershey," which had been proposed by more than 2,000 contestants. In the end, Mr. Hershey accepted it, and we all can be thankful for it. 🙎

The Town of Hershekoko.

The contest inaugurated by Mr. M. S. Hershey for the purpose of securing what he should consider the most suitable name for the new town he is building at Derry Church, near Harrisburg, is over, Mr. Hershey having chosen the name of "Hershekoko." It was sent in by Mrs. T. K. Doyle, of 284 Northampton street, Wilkesbarre, and she receives the prize of \$100. A Lancaster gentleman made a close shave for the prize, having sent in the same name as Mrs. Doyle, but using c's instead of k's in spelling koko.

New Town Named Hershey.

The owners of the Hershey chocolate works, near Derry Church, have finally decided to name the station Hershey. It was at first decided to name it Hersheykoko, and a prize was given for the name.

Milton Hershey School's First Gold Star Boy

he Milton Hershey School Gold Star Alumni roster includes 57 graduates spanning eight decades, starting with Harold Ashenfelder '40, who served in the United States Navy during World War II. He is memorialized through student home Ashenfelder.

Early Life

Harold enrolled in Hershey Industrial School (now MHS) in 1932 after his mother passed away. He lived at student home Swatara with 20 other boys. Harold worked on the farm, milked cows, and helped with household chores. At school, he participated in the accounting, agriculture, and leathercraft clubs and played football for one year.

His classmates spoke highly of him. They recalled that he collected pictures of movie stars and hoped to one day be the president of MGM Studios. After graduation, he worked at The Hotel Hershey, which often hosted famous clientele who came to visit the town or perform at Hershey Theatre.

Answering the Call

Just 12 days after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor in December 1941, Harold enlisted in the U.S. Navy. He was trained as a radio operator in a seaplane. After some basic training in Virginia, he was deployed to Newfoundland. There he supplied support to facilities critical to the squadron's upkeep.

While in Newfoundland, the weather was often extremely difficult for flying, and new radar technology was prone to frequent failures. On June 8, 1942, just

two years after graduating from MHS, Harold was on patrol when bad weather and heavy fog forced the plane to land in the Atlantic Ocean. Rescue aircraft were unable to reach them in time. All 10 members of the crew were reported lost at sea.

Today, Harold is memorialized on the East Coast Memorial in New York City dedicated to those who lost their lives at sea during World War II. MHS remembers its first Gold Star Boy through student home Ashenfelder, which was created in honor of both Harold and all MHS Gold Star Alumni. 🙎

Alumna Builds on MHS Authentic Work Experience to Create Her BREAKTHROUGH

"In retrospect, I've been working in the graphic design industry for more than 10 years, and I'm only turning 28. That's pretty wild. The opportunities I received at MHS created a snowball effect. They led me to RIT, which helped me get jobs and put me on the path to financial success."



hen you Google "The True Meaning of Family," one of the first links posted is a blog on Milton Hershey School's website written in 2016 by a school graduate. At the time, as a freshman in college, the author talks about how blood relations do not define family. It's characterized by those who love and support you. It's fitting because the author, Tatiana Ariola '15, is a storyteller by nature and now by profession. Even years later, her story continues to invite more and more people to learn about MHS.

Growing up in a coal mining town in northeastern Pennsylvania, Tatiana struggled to foresee a future for herself. When she was 10 years old, her mom got sick and went through a very long process to be eventually diagnosed with multiple sclerosis. Her mom was in and out of work, struggling to support three children. That's when Tatiana heard about MHS through her brother's classmate.

"I actually convinced my mom to let me apply," she said. "I knew Milton Hershey School helped pay for college, and in my head, I knew that was my only route to college. I knew I didn't have the money to pay for it myself."

A motivated student, Tatiana always knew she wanted to be involved in the arts. She enrolled in the seventh grade at MHS in 2009. She found her passion in high school and leaned into the Graphic Communication Technologies pathway as part of the Career and Technical Education program. There, she met and started training with teacher Mindy Harmon, who helped mold Tatiana's passion and helped her learn an art career could be a good choice.

"Ms. Harmon helped me develop my skills. She helped me get certified in things that led me to get graphic design internships and, eventually, jobs. Those jobs financially supported me through my first year of college."

While at MHS, Tatiana interned as a graphic designer with Hershey Entertainment & Resorts in its creative department and helped design a new cup for the Hershey Bears. That same year, she interned with the MHS Office of Communications and worked on various projects, including updating the Spartan Head logo.

In fall 2015, she attended the Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT) in Rochester, New York, and continued to expand her skills and knowledge. She interned in New York City with a commercial advertising still-life photographer. When she graduated from RIT, she worked as a marketing assistant doing photography and design and started Tatiana Ariola Photography in 2018. A year later, she and her partner opened Hill



+ Valley Creative, a full-service production company based in Rochester.

"I don't know what it is, but I've always had an internal satisfaction of doing things," she said. "I think I'm a little selfish because a lot of my success comes from an internal need to be happy. I've found that happiness and health create wealth, and I've found a life that helps me do that."

As Hill + Valley's creative director, she crafts her clients' stories through photography, video direction, postproduction, and design. She also runs Tat Voyage, a travel consulting business that helps people travel on a budget.

As for the true meaning of family?

"It's funny when I say I'm going home, people assume that my parents live in Hershey," she said. "It's funny, (MHS) is not just a school, it's home. It's having a support system. If I ever needed help, I would find it there. The MHS network transcends so many ideations of what networks are supposed to be. Home is where the people that you love are. It's a place of safety and comfort. If I could say thank you to anyone, I would say thank you to Mr. and Mrs. Hershey for literally everything."



Zainabu Sesav-Harrell '95. **Career Accomplishment**

Zainabu describes herself as an ambitious leader and entrepreneur who aims to improve outcomes in under-served communities around the world. She strives to help people acknowledge and understand the need for community awareness and identify health disparities. She promotes inclusiveness, engagement, and education through leadership and empowerment.

Zainabu has 32 years of health care experience, including 24 years of professional experience as a registered nurse/ advanced practice nurse in international and global health, medicine, surgery, and critical care. She also has extensive experience in project execution. She is passionate about implementing, supporting, and promoting health services, and delivering quality care. She has been a nurse educator, pharmacy executive and owner, organizational education coordinator, and environmental advocate for chronic illnesses.

More recently, she helped others learn how to create small business opportunities in and with Africa. An advocate for communities in Africa and in the United States, she focuses on health care, education, youth, women, and injustice reduction. She also is a professional consultant for The Republic of Sierra Leone, West Africa, and founder of Connectin the Dotz, a mobile marketing and consultation agency providing all forms of marketing, branding, promoting, and advertising. In addition, she has been a candidate for member of Parliament for The Republic of Sierra Leone, West Africa. In

March, she was appointed as a university professor in Makeni, Sierra Leone, and as an instructor for the City University of New York. Zainabu earned a bachelor's degree in nursing at The College of New Rochelle

and a master's degree in nursing with a concentration in adult health education at City University of New York - Herbert H. Lehman College. She is enrolled in a doctoral program at Ernest Bai Koroma University of Science and Technology in Sierra Leone.

Zainabu is a member of many professional organizations, including but not limited to Sigma Theta Tau International nursing honor society, the National Black Nurses Association, including 10 years on the executive board; and Sierra Leone Nurses Association, Inc., where she has served as president, founder, and international health and global health education coordinator and consultant.



Joshua Arledge '15, Academic Excellence

Joshua is a teacher of the deaf and an American Sign Language instructor who has earned bachelor's and master's degrees. During his undergraduate education at Gallaudet University, the only university in the world for deaf students, Joshua participated in several international exchange programs, including a semester in Buenos Aires, Argentina, an internship at the National Institute for the Deaf in Bogota, Colombia, and a research project in India as a recipient of the Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship from the U.S. Department of State.

In 2019, Joshua earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education with a specialization in deaf education and a minor in Spanish from Gallaudet University. He was also recognized with two awards, including the Most Outstanding Undergraduate award for his dedication to excellence in the field of education and the Delaney Townsley Yeager Award for his dedication to deaf populations in Latin America.

Joshua completed his student teaching requirements in a fourth-grade classroom at Sidwell Friends School in Washington, D.C. He then went on to teach fifth grade at Westhill Institute in Mexico City. During the 2020-21 school year, Joshua taught at Texas School for the Deaf. He then spent a year teaching American Sign Language as a second language through Pearson Connections Academy. In May 2022, Joshua completed a master's degree in deaf education, maintaining a 4.0 GPA and obtaining additional certification in English as a Second Language instruction at Texas Woman's University. He completed this degree through a grant from the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Special Education Programs.

Joshua currently works as a contractor providing virtual services to deaf and hard-ofhearing students in underserved communities across the country. In addition, he most recently became an associate faculty member at Cochise College where he teaches American Sign Language 101. As an MHS senior, Joshua was awarded the MHS Alumni Achievement Award for career accomplishment.



Community Service

Todd is the founder of TIM Heroes, Inc., a non-profit organization with a mission to provide outreach material, resources, and training related to traffic incident management (TIM) to the public, schools, motorists, and emergency responders. The organization will also work closely with similar non-profits and organizations to support their missions. The main objective of TIM Heroes is to raise awareness about the importance of roadway safety and provide funding for training related to this issue.

Todd joined Jacobs Engineering as a traffic incident management specialist after retiring from the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission in 2023. He also serves as the Deputy Director of Training at the Emergency Responder Safety Institute.

Todd received numerous awards for his work in traffic incident management and public safety communication. In 2023, he was honored as the 2023 Pennsylvania Turnpike "Turnpiker" Employee of the Year. In 2022, he received the Mrs. Smith Award for Traffic Incident Management and Responder Safety from the South Central Task Force at the Homeland Security Conference. In addition, Todd received the Joseph W. Bukowski Memorial Award for Outstanding Efforts in Highway Safety, issued by Cumberland Valley Volunteer Fireman's Association in August 2019; the 2018 ITS-PA Person of the Year, and the 2019 and 2023 ITS-PA Project of the Year issued by Intelligent Transportation Systems - Pennsylvania.

Todd earned a certificate in public safety communications from Jacksonville State University. He is certified as a master traffic incident management (TIM) instructor and a public safety telecommunicator instructor by APCO International, the world's oldest and largest organization of public safety communications professionals.

Jedrek Kumi '24, **Career Accomplishment**

Having enrolled in MHS in 10th grade, Jedrek became active in a variety of extracurricular programs, including Student Government Association (SGA), varsity soccer, and track and field. 
Washington, D.C. Chapter




